God's elect, who has had communion with Christ and leaned upon Him for his comfort. Look at David! Many will talk of his sin, but I ask you to look at his repentance and hear his broken bones as each one of them moans out its mournful confession! Consider his tears as they fall upon the ground, and the deep sighs with which he accompanies the softened music of his harp!

We have strayed: Let us, therefore, seek the spirit of penitence. Look again at Peter! We often speak of how he denied Christ. Remember, it is written, "He wept bitterly." Do we have no denials of our Lord to be lamented with tears? These sins of ours, before and after conversion, would consign us to the place of inextinguishable fire if it were not for God's sovereign mercy, which snatched us like sticks from the fire.

My soul, bow down under a sense of your natural sinfulness, and worship your God. Admire the grace that saves you - the mercy that spares you - the love that pardons you!

After all, I only led one person to saving faith in Christ at Liberty Travel and, although the retirement community was Christian-owned and operated, my job was to provide recreation programs for the 300 residents there... not exactly a sacred calling... or was it?

The truth of the matter is that I think God was just as pleased - and glorified - by my making people's travel arrangements and organizing resident trips and other activities at the Wiley Christian Retirement Community as He was during my tenures with SPM and RTC. The bottom line is that any vocation can be... and should be... considered a divine calling if God has placed you there and you are giving it your absolute all. Here is what Charles Spurgeon, the "Prince of Preachers," had to say on the subject...

"Take care, dear reader, that you do not neglect the path of duty by leaving your occupation, and take care you do not dishonor your profession while in it. Think little of yourselves, but do not think too little of your callings. Every lawful trade may be sanctified by the Gospel to noblest ends. Turn to the Bible, and you will find the most menial forms of labor connected either with most daring deeds of faith or with persons whose lives have been illustrations of holiness."

"Therefore do not be discontented with your calling. Whatever God has made your position or your work, remain in that, unless you are quite sure that He calls you to something else. Let your first concern be to glorify God to the best of your ability where you are. Fill your present sphere to His praise, and if He needs you in another, He will show it to you. This evening lay aside anxious ambition, and embrace peaceful content."

My Death Valley Experiences

I invite you to look back on your life and ask yourself a singular question...

During which times did you grow the most spiritually: (A) the mountaintop experiences or (B) when you were down in the valley? If you are like me, there is only one possible (and correct) answer, and it is B.

Sure, sitting atop a mountain and basking in God's glory is a lot more fun than wallowing in the depths of a dark and dreary valley. But I dare say that more growth takes place in the cold, wet valleys of life where we are crying out to God and clinging helplessly but determinedly to His promises.

Of course, no one wants to stay in those valleys longer than necessary. After all, we are all human and tests, trials, troubles, and tribulations can drain you physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually. However, the lessons learned there - when properly applied - can and will serve you extremely well in your Christian walk. For instance, I have been fully "broken" at least twice in my life. The first time came after graduating college in 1981. I couldn't find a full-time job in my chosen field for 10 months and the girl that I planned to marry dumped me unceremoniously. The second time was in 2011, when our family relocated from New Jersey to Florida. I went from leading a very successful prison ministry where I earned \$70,000 per year to grossing \$18,000 working three part-time jobs.

Would I want to repeat either of those "Death Valley" experiences? Not on your life! But were they necessary

for my spiritual growth and development? Absolutely!

I wouldn't go so far as saying that I am now, in the words of Charles Spurgeon, a "golden Christian." However, I can gaze in the rearview mirror of life and say that I am marginally but discernably more

Christlike. I judge less, forgive more, and hold fewer grudges. Best of all, I love more deeply and unconditionally.
